


# A WORD FROM THE FOUNDER

Keeping it real means I share both the good and the bad. As some of you know, 2014 included surviving some of the most difficult adversity I have faced. I firmly believe that trust and loyalty must be core values - the root of friendship, the bond of family, and the key to a successful business relationship. I experienced the betrayal of a lifetime from a coworker who I took as a brother; my family and dear friends suffered along with me. Although this involved a former coworker, this was a personal loss not affecting OLW's finances. I am incredibly grateful for the love, support, and advice from family, friends, the OLW Board Members and Advisors, and the Most High who gave me the strength to manage this catastrophe. Dealing with this painful betrayal consumed far too much time in 2014. Recovery was an agonizing process over many months, but I'm still standing. When I reflect on the number of lives saved by the work of OLW, I am motivated and reassured that this is my calling. I have learned so much from this experience and am stronger because of it. I am ever ready to continue my work in Ghana.





In 2014, I traveled to Ghana twice staying a total of eight weeks at the OLW Camp. This year we celebrated an important milestone – safe access to clean water for more than 20,000 people! We completed five water projects providing 10,000+ people with clean water. I visited OLW's six other water projects to discover water flowing strong at every borehole. Friends, our water project model is working! I remain forever grateful to the OLW supporters who continue to make our life-changing work possible, especially the Hobbs Community. The Hobbs Benefit truly made our year; thank you to those who made it happen. Please keep supporting us as we continue to get water.

Our water projects focus on long-term sustainable solutions. The ultimate goal is for the community to manage its water system without our assistance. Accomplishing such an ambitious goal requires a unique plan implemented over a period of time. Not only do we invest in materials, but we truly invest in people. We educate indigenous people on the importance of sanitation and hygiene. Teaching a family to abandon their ancestors' traditions, such as fetching water from the river, is incredibly challenging. We tread lightly on tradition and culture, as we educate with passion and love. Love must be at our core - it simply must.



With each project, our technician takes it upon himself to educate the village, especially the youth, on how to care for the water system. Here he educates the youth on how to properly use this particular pumping system. He is counting to 10, as he explains that the system should work without problems for the next 10 years.

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
NUMBER OF WATER PROJECTS

# **EASTERN REGION**

Although we are established to operate without geographical limitation, we work on a need basis and the water crisis in Ghana continues to be just that - a crisis. We are currently operating throughout Ghana's Eastern Region.

# WATER REHABILITATIONS

Until we have our own drilling machine, the most effective and cost-efficient way to bring water to the most amount of people is through rehabilitations. Rehabilitation is a complex process, but through this process we ensure water sustainability in the villages.

Our rehabilitations typically work like this:

- respond to a request for assistance by assessing a village's water crisis
- research the history of the crisis
- collect demographics
- build a water team from within the village
- educate the community on the importance of sanitation and hygiene
- create a plan for the repair
- initiate community involvement the village must give time and financial contributions to the water project
- repair the borehole
- train the water team to independently manage water sales, operational expenses, and funds for future repairs
- oversee the water project operation to assure long-term success and sustainability



CLAUSSEN BOREHOLE The borehole in Wawase Village quit working in 2011; fetching, swimming, and bathing in this contaminated river is what we found.







Removing 140 feet of pipe by hand, in 10 foot intervals, in 95° heat and 95% humidity, under the scorching African sun, is an incredibly challenging task. We do whatever it takes to get water!



This borehole in Achiansah Village had been inoperable since 2012, leaving a majority of the community fetching contaminated river water.




Repairing a village's borehole is a monumental event; we love when the youth gather around the repair.



# YAKOKO BOREHOLE



This was our second project in Yakoko Village. A portion of the community continued fetching contaminated river water, so we repaired a second borehole closer to the river.

# TEACHER MANTE

Teacher Mante Village is home to OLW's very first water project. From the OLW Camp, we track roughly two miles to fetch water from this borehole.

This borehole remains our only borehole with an electric pump.
The pump sends water to the polytank, which sends water to four fetching points throughout the community of 7,000+. After three years, the weight of the polytank destroyed the stand. We rebuilt the stand making it much stronger.
As shown in our 2013 Annual Report, the repair started in 2013, but was completed in 2014.

ISAAC

In 2010, we met Isaac who could not open his left eye. We shared his story with a supporter who kindly donated funds to provide him with medical treatment. Not only did Isaac regain full vision, but his entire personality positively improved.

He has a new confidence and is excelling in school.

Like Isaac, sometimes we come across people whose circumstances present us with a real opportunity to help. We primarily focus on healthcare and education. Our assistance brings positive change and hope for tomorrow. We are proud to now have an official program to assist a handful of people each year.



### AMA

We met Ama in 2012 as her father, Gabriel, often worked with us. Her father tragically passed away in 2013; Ama is now being raised by her paternal grandparents who struggle to care for her. We are providing her with an education and helping with her care.

AMA

We met another sweet girl named Ama in 2014 while working on a water project in her village. When Karli asked Ama if she was going to school, Ama said she had paid the school fees, bought the uniform, but did not have shoes. We fixed that!



MAFIA



We first met Mafia in 2012 and provided her with medication, as she was suffering from malnutrition. In 2014 we officially took her under our wing. She is now attending school for the first time in her life and eating nutritious meals. The photo on the left is the day we started caring for her and the right is just two weeks later.

# TOYS

In 2013, St. Helena School in Hobbs, NM, collected and donated 275 toys and over \$500. In September 2014, we toted 50 pounds of toys on the back of a motorbike and gave them to the youth of our water project locations.

# **OLW HEADQUARTERS – SUITE 520**

As mentioned in the OLW 2013 Annual Report, we moved into our U.S. Headquarters in November 2013. After months of hard work, we have opened our doors at the Don Garey Tower in Hobbs, NM.



Supporters donated time, furniture, carpet, and appliances, among other things. Lowe's was wonderful in discounting the materials needed to refurbish, and Leaco donated free internet service. Debbie Garey and Lisa Jones continue to donate this office space. Try to understand how absolutely instrumental this generous contribution is to our operation. # OLW CAMP



The OLW headquarters in Ghana is integral to our operation, and proper maintenance is a must. Rainy season brought erosion problems, so we brought our masons for reinforcement.















After the foundation reinforcement around the house was completed, we then focused on leveling the compound.



These men were so impressive. This type of work without any powered machinery is difficult to even imagine. They did a great job!











We built a bamboo shower room in 2013, but the harsh bush conditions took its toll on the bamboo. After 14 months with no shower room, it was time to rebuild. We used hand-made cement blocks to convert the original rectangular platform into a nice round platform surrounded by walls.



We used concrete stepping stones and covered the inside with beautiful tropical plants. We finished both the shower room and the camp boundary walls with a cement plaster followed by a local cement spray and a Zia! Viewing of the finished product is available in person, so come see it!

However, we do whatever it takes to maintain meticulous records of every penny we spend.




